




















GRDIA Community Events



GRDIA hosted its very first Learn to Play Mahjong Night on May 20. Eight generous local businesses and families sponsored this fun-filled evening. GR teens assisted with set up and breakdown. GRDIA entertained, fed and taught a full-capacity crowd filling fourteen tables. The town's interest and support was so overwhelming that we were able to raise a generous amount of funds to put towards our next community event.

GRDIA interviewed Madeline Bettenbender, the Vice President of the GRHS Gay Straight Alliance (GSA), to talk about their most successful club year to date, with over 100 members signing up at the beginning of the year. Madeline noted that this year, in addition to the LGBTQ+ students, they had more allies than ever joining. She pointed out that young people are generally becoming more comfortable coming out and feeling supported, and that movements such as BLM have spurred kids to lend more visible support to all marginalized communities.



One of the things Madeline was most proud of this year was the club's ability to build community and give students a positive, safe, fun space to be with their friends and meet new people. She also spoke about how the GSA met with Principal Lawlor to discuss a list of issues based on input from their membership. Their list included changing Skyward to allow a non-binary gender option; requesting educational reforms to increase LGBTQ+ representation in literature, health, and history classes; and requesting that the administration take stronger action when students use anti-LGBTQ+ slurs. Madeline and the President of the GSA, Rylee Allen, are both graduating seniors and hope that the new officers and members will continue the work they started this year and maintain the strong sense of community that they've built. Madeline said the younger kids are passionate and motivated, and she has faith that they'll continue making progress, so that GSA, and GRHS as a whole, becomes a better place for all students.

The History of **Juneteenth**



June 19, 1865 is known as Emancipation Day because it marks the true ending of slavery. On this date, the Union Army arrived in Galveston, Texas to announce that all African-American slaves were free in accordance with President Abraham Lincoln's Emancipation Proclamation. Texas was the last state in the Confederacy to receive word that the Civil War was over and that slavery had been abolished.

Last year (2021) Juneteenth became a federal holiday.



On June 14, the 4th graders at Ridgewood Avenue School welcomed local author Alliah Agostini in celebration of Juneteenth. Ms. Agostini read passages from her book, **The Juneteenth Story**, and answered questions. The funding support for this U.S. History learning activity was provided by the RAS HSA.

On Sunday November 28, 2021, the occasion of the "first ever first night" lighting of the Glen Ridge town's chanukiah (more known as a menorah) occurred. Several members of the town's Jewish community organized a gathering in front of the municipal building.

All Ridgers were invited and many came to enjoy real sufganiot (jelly donuts) and learn how to play the dreidel game. Betsy Ginsburg, our BOE president, was given the honor of lighting the first candle in recognition of her personal and the entire district's efforts to create a community of respect and friendship. The "December Dilemma" is a time of great stress for many families that either identify as Jewish or seek to incorporate traditions and sensibilities of family members. This public recognition of Chanukah sent a message to the Jewish community that we are beloved full members of the community. Many people who never knew much about Chanukah were excited to be invited into the tradition and have the opportunity to ask the questions that sparked their curiosity. Chanukah means rededication and the holiday served to be a moment of re-dedication of all Ridgers' commitment to an open community with room for all.
